#### NMSI: Cultivating the Next Generation of Leaders!

Since its inception in 2014, The National Migrant Scholars Internship (NMSI) Initiative has been steadfast in its mission to nurture the next generation of leaders. Our dedication revolves around equipping young minds with the skills and knowledge essential to become tomorrow's leaders. NMSI provides an array of resources, including professional development, financial support, and experiential learning opportunities. In a significant stride toward our goal, this year, we supported 32 College Assistance Migrant Program (CAMP) scholars nationwide with internship opportunities.

As we approach the end of the year, it is fitting to reflect on the accomplishments of the NMSI team and the achievements of CAMP students. Notably, Diana Marroguin from Miami Dade College made substantial contributions as a Portfolio Management Intern at CoBank. We take pride in promoting diversity among employers in various sectors such as finance, marketing, healthcare, social advocacy, and food & agriculture research.

In 2023, we welcomed Salvador Chavez, a CAMP alumnus from Michigan State University (MSU), as our new Associate Director. Salvador brings over 10 years of experience in Career Services and Workforce Management, offering invaluable expertise. His unique perspective and understanding of the migrant and seasonal farmworker community enable him to empathize with their needs and challenges.

This year, NMSI prioritized communication and collaboration with employer networks, providing recruitment and outreach support to organizations such as CoBank, Ally Financial, GreenStone, The Boeing Company, Kellogg's, HITT Contracting, the East Coast Migrant Head Start Project, Sparrow Hospital, and the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS). We organized an internship informational session with Kellogg's and their HOLA program, collaborated with the ALPFA Regional Student Symposium, and hosted a USDA webinar on Federal job applications, attended by students from nine universities nationwide.

In our ongoing efforts to enhance collaboration with CAMP programs nationwide, NMSI staff conducted in-person presentations in New Mexico and Texas, connecting with over 60 CAMP students from Northern New Mexico College, University of New Mexico, New Mexico State University, and West Texas A&M University.

Participating in the 2023 National HEP/CAMP Association Conference in San Diego was a privilege. NMSI values the collaboration and support from the HEP/CAMP Association

- and remains committed to supporting CAMP students nationwide. We extend our gratitude to the association for allowing NMSI to showcase a special message from our scholars, serving 14 universities and colleges, close to onethird of all CAMP programs nationwide.
- As we approach our 10th anniversary next year, we take pride in facilitating over 230 successful matches between scholars and internships in their respective fields of study. Collaborating with more than 150 employers in recent years, we continue to receive interest from many, attesting to the enduring impact of our programs. Since 2014, CoBank has generously supported NMSI and the dynamic practices that lead to the securement of internships and professional development for Migrant Seasonal Farm Worker (MSFW) students, ensuring a diverse labor force.


The National Migrant Scholars Internship Initiative advocates for adaptive hiring practices that support MSFW students who have participated in the College Assistance Migrant Program (CAMP). NMSI facilitates the connection between students and employers and provides a pool of qualified diverse candidates to employers. Additionally, NMSI identifies potential financial burdens students may encounter during their internship, eliminates them, and develops an Employer Agreement that directly supports the student.

NMSI's focus is on three supportive areas that target financial, experiential learning, and professional development to ensure the holistic development of tomorrow's labor force.

CAMP is federally funded through the U.S. Department of Education, Office of Migrant Education. CAMP assists students who are migratory or seasonal farmworkers (or children of such workers) enrolled in their first year of undergraduate studies at an Institution of Higher Education. The funding supports the completion of the first year of studies. The program serves approximately 2,000 CAMP participants annually nationwide.

## Our Main Area of Expertise

NMSI's focus is on three supportive areas that target financial, experiential learning, and professional development. NMSI's Financial support alleviates and removes financial barriers that MSFW students face during an internship. NMSI guarantees a Learning outcome that provides hands-on experience that will ultimately support their competitiveness in the workforce upon graduation. For preparation, NMSI provides Professional Development workshops that cater to the MSFW student population.





#### 2023 INDUSTRIES WITH NMSI INTERNS




State and Local Government
